





NGSA ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

This year's BUXTON SCHOLASTIC ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS PRESENTATION saw 14 graduates from primary schools in the village receiving bursary awards totaling \$650,000 in recognition of their outstanding performance at the 2022 NGSA (formerly Common Entrance) Examination. The ceremony was held on 6th November at Company Road Primary School under the theme: "Make The Best Of Your Education".

Among the special guests was Miss Chantelle Paul. She is both a past beneficiary of Buxton-Friendship Heritage Fund's Student Empowerment Programme (STEP) for new secondary school students and sole recipient of the 2018 Annie Daniels Memorial Scholarship Award. Miss Paul, who is now a finalyear Law student at the University of Guyana, in delivering some timely remarks, shared her inspiring academic journey with the audience.

The event was also honoured with the presence of Former First Lady, Mrs. Sandra Granger. Her office sponsored the BUXTON YOUTH DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVE, which provided remedial classes for primary school children in the community. Mrs. Granger delivered the Keynote Address. CONTINUING SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS TO MAKE THE BEST OF EDUCATION OPPORTUNITY

Fourteen students, who qualified for list A secondary schools at the 2022 National Grade Six Assessment (NGSA) examination, were presented with a total of \$650,000 in cash bursaries.

Through the ANNIE DANIELS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP foundation, Dr. Kerwin Charles - Dean and Professor of Economics, Policy, and Management at Yale University's School of Management - provided \$375,000, which was distributed equally to the top three students. This is the 16th year that the foundation has offered the award in remembrance of Dr. Charles' maternal grandmother. His parents, Mr. & Mrs. Reuben Charles made the presentations.

Another \$275,000 was granted by the Buxton-Friendship Heritage Fund through the huge generosity of Messrs. Reuben Robinson, Charles Dougall and Leon McLennon, and Ms. Jenifer Wendella Hodge. This amount was shared equally among the eleven students who qualified for Annandale Secondary School.



CHANTELLE SHARES KEYS TO SUCCESS

She was a special guest at the 2022 Scholastic Achievement Awards presentation ceremony, where she was invited to share the experience of her inspiring and successful academic journey with the students and other members of the audience.

In 2013, she took the National Grade Six Assessment (NGSA) examination at Friendship Primary School. As an incoming high school student that year, Chantelle participated in the BUXTON-FRIENDSHIP HERITAGE FUND's Student Empowerment Programme (STEP). In 2018, she was the sole recipient of the ANNIE DANIELS' MEMORIAL SCHOLAR-SHIP AWARD for her outstanding performance at the Caribbean Secondary **Education Certificate examination.**

Here's her address:

"It is a great pleasure and honour that I stand before you as a 20-year old Buxton scholar to share my personal experience with you.

Who am I, you may ask? For those of you who do not know me, my name is Chantelle Paul. I was given the name by my cousin, Stephen Sam, when he visited Guyana in December 2001. But who I am today is a reflection of whom I was and where I came from.

Imagine that, as a three-year old child, I could not spell my name. It is quite long, has nine letters, and I had a hard time putting the letters together. So, I created a shorter version - "Chanel 9", and that nickname has stuck with me.

I eventually became a Spelling Bee champion, not only for my [St. Augustine Anglican] Church, but I also represented the East Coast [Demerara] and Georgetown at the national levels where I was successful.

My journey began [in 2013] when I was awarded 489 marks at the NGSA and a place at Annandale Secondary School. In that moment, I thought I was a failure and a disappointment to a lot of people. However, I did not let that thought consume my abilities.

Two years later, I was given a chance to write the Placement Examination, and I was awarded a place at St. Stanislaus' College. After one chapter concluded, I started another where I was preparing to write the CSEC examination. This is where Life threw challenges at me, considering I was at a disadvantage - I did not attend extra lessons. Notwithstanding, I wrote and passed eleven (11) subjects, which made me the top CSEC student for Buxton in 2018.

I furthered my CAPE (Caribbean Advanced Proficiency Examination) studies at The Bishops' High School, and I was successful in receiving an Associate's Degree in Law. I am currently a final-year Law student at the University of Guyana.

During my school life and accomplishments, I tried to maintain a balanced life where I find the time to take part in extra-curricular activities. I attended Sunday School in my primary school years; I was a member of Guyana Scouts' Association; I spent time with friends; and much more. My mom also made sure that I did house chores. After all, "all work and no play makes Jack a dull boy".

Behind all my accomplishments, I had the full support of my family, who played a major role and always believed in my potential. It's not all diamonds. Some days were tough, but I never lost sight of my goal.

To the parents and guardians, I encourage you, please, to make time for your children or child. Sometimes, it is not always about financial support, but just to know that you have someone there by your side is enough to get through a tough day.

Seeing me here, you may assume I had everything and my life sorted out. But no! Life does not always give handouts and free passes. There will be obstacles, and there will be challenges.

I want to let you know that as you elevate in life, sometimes your journey might not be led by a straight path. There will be curves; there will be bumps; there will be ups and downs. But, never let that stop you from reaching your true destiny and potential! Perseverance is the key. Never lose sight of your dreams, because you can accomplish anything once you believe in you!

EDUCATION EMANCIPATES US

It is always a pleasure for me to be in Buxton, more so on an occasion such as this one honouring the academic achievements of the students of this community.

Back in 2015, I met with community leaders here to find out their views on the kind of project I could do which would be beneficial to this community. The unanimous choice was: Education. So, working with community leaders, teachers and parents, we began the Buxton Youth Development Initiative which provided remedial classes based on the school curriculum for primary school children from Friendship Primary, Buxton Primary and Company Road Primary whom the teachers had identified. They attended classes three times a week and, over time, through the dedication of our Coordinator, Deon Abrams and our volunteer teachers, we saw improvements in the literacy rate and the number of children who were successful in the NGSA, with some students gaining places at the Bishops' High School, St. Rose's, St. Joseph's and President's College. To tell you the truth, I felt like a proud grandmother when I saw those children fulfilling their potential. I feel the same way today, when I look at the bright faces of these young people who have started their secondary school education.

I have always been impressed by the importance which this village and this community attach to education. They recognise that education is vital for the growth and development of the individual leads to the growth and development of the community and the country. Over a century ago, they set up a scholarship fund to send deserving students to university. They value knowledge. They value the opportunities that come to us through education. I think it also fosters that sense of pride they feel in being Buxtonian wherever in the world they may be.

That tradition continues today as we celebrate the young people who succeeded at the NGSA and have now entered Grade Seven. The late Nelson Mandela, freedom fighter, boxer, lawyer and President of South Africa, said that "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world."

When we speak about education, we are not only talking about what we used to call "book learning." (We have to expand it in this age of technology.) Book learning is important. We need it to increase our knowledge not only about the subjects we are studying in school, but also ourselves, the world around us, technology, climate change and the impact these have on our lives. Education is also what we learn from the world around us. Our day-to-day experiences with people, animals, places and things, are equally important. Education includes our traditions which build our sense of belonging: the food we eat, our music and dance, our language – what we say, how we say it and when we say it. It includes the tradition of going to the "line top" to commemorate Emancipation and honouring the ancestors. It includes knowing the history of these villages and the people who built it, such as one I learnt as a child about Buxton people stopping the Governor's train to protest against high taxes. It includes folklore, 'Nansi story and stories about various village people which have been passed down from generation to generation.

Students, this Awards Ceremony recognises and honours your achievement and lets you know how proud the people of the Buxton-Friendship Heritage Fund are of you. The members of this audience are here because they, too, are proud of you. The theme of this year's event is "Make the Best of Your Education."

Make the Best of your Education by learning all you can about the subjects which interest you and which you think may help you in the career you choose to pursue. There is so much knowledge out there, in books, on the internet, on the television, and in the experience and knowledge of your elders.

One thing I will emphasise: build up your language skills. No matter how competent you are in whatever field you choose, you have to communicate. And to communicate successfully, you have to have a good grasp of language: to understand it and to share information with it. Your language skills have to be better than good; more so, as you are promoted and advance in your field. So, please read. We need more than "ldk," "Imao," "lol" and so on. You have to read so that you can give clear instructions when you become the big boss.

Make the Best of Your Education by seeking knowledge about the issues which are important to you, and these will change and evolve as you grow older.

Make the Best of Your Education and do not let anyone, ever, tell you who you are and where you ought to be.

Sometimes, it will not be easy. Things may get hard, and you may feel that there's no sense in getting an education. As you grow, your friends (and maybe some family members) may encourage you to set aside your assignments and go with them to sport, whenever two spoons knock, or just to lime. Some of your friends may be afraid that you will leave them behind. Far from it! Education makes you bigger. Better. Stronger.

I promise you, there will be someone in your community, or several ones, for that matter, who will encourage you and guide you along the way.

As you learn more, you begin to reason for yourself. You will not be led by anyone telling you to do this or do that. To go here or go there. You will ask: Why? Why are you telling me to do this? Why should I go there? Why do you want me to go there? You begin to understand the logic of things.

Make the Best of your Education, be disciplined in whatever field you choose, so you have the knowledge and the power and the freedom to make the right choices for yourself and the choices that will help you become another proud woman or man from Buxton-Friendship.

How many of you know Bob Marley's "Redemption Song"? Do you remember those famous words: "Emancipate yourselves from mental slavery / None but our selves can free our minds..."? Education emancipates us. Education gives us the tools to shape our world.

METHOD FOR SQUARING OF A CIRCLE

By Lyndon O. Barton

Lyndon O. Barton, the Guyana-born author of <u>Mechanism Analysis-Simplified Graphical and Analytical Techniques</u> 1st and 2nd Editions (a textbook written for mechanical engineers and students of mechanical engineering) has recently published a research paper entitled, "A Method for the Squaring of a Circle. "That is, a graphical method for constructing a square that is equivalent to that of a given circle, using only an unmarked straightedge and a compass, and achieving this result in a finite number of steps. 

For background, the historical significance of this paper lies in the fact that, besides being rooted in antiquity (around 450 B.C.), it was, <u>until recently</u>, one of <u>the three unsolvable problems</u> of Geometry — the other two being the <u>doubling of a cube</u> and <u>the trisection of an angle</u>, which Lyndon has solved (see https://www.scirp.org/journal/paperinformation.aspx?paperid=120068

Now that the **squaring of a circle problem** has been solved, there remains only one unsolvable problem of Geometry.

Lyndon is a retired Senior Engineer of the E. I. DuPont De Nemours Company, and resident of Delaware. He graduated *cum laude* from Howard University with a Bachelor of Science degree in mechanical engineering. He is also a graduate of the University of Delaware with a Master of Science degree in mechanical and aerospace engineering. Apart from his primary career as an engineer, Lyndon has been engaged in a variety of pursuits over the years. For example: **As a writer**, in addition to his text-book on **Mechanism Analysis** mentioned above,



Lyndon is the author of dozens of technical papers in engineering and mathematics, as well as booklets entitled. "Search and Find with Guyana in Mind." and "FUN Multiplication Puzzles."

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Lynette Anderson-Thomas

A Licensed Practical Nurse, Lynette gave 33 years of dedicated service to patients in the New York City hospitals of Bellevue, Lennox Hill, Mount Sinai, and Beth Israel. In June 1979, when a budding flutist was pushed onto the E train tracks severing her arm, Lynette was a lauded member of the Bellevue team that performed all-night surgery and successfully reattached the limb. This was one of her proudest professional moments.

Lynetic was born to Pearl Ifill and George "StirAbout" Anderson on October 5, 1934 in Buxton Village. She attended St. Augustine's Anglican School, Tutorial High School, and the Carnegie School of Home Economics, after which she worked as an expert dressmaker. But she dreamed of becoming a nurse - a dream deferred due to her mother's death when she was a teenager. Lynette seized the opportunity to pursue her nursing studies when she immigrated to the United States in 1967. Through night school, working double shifts in hospitals and nursing homes, grit, and determination, she lifted herself up from nurses' aide to LPN while focused on the welfare of her six children.

She was a strong proponent of education. "You must go to school" was her mantra to people of all ages. She demonstrated her love for family and friends by sharing her joy of cooking and by showing up, regardless of the distance, to provide support in their times of joy, grief, or sorrow.

In retirement, she travelled extensively, exploring other cultures in Egypt, Ghana, Nigeria, Peru,

Panama, the Philippines, and Senegal. And, consistent with her love of learning, she took swimming lessons at her neighborhood recreational center, creative writing classes at her church, and piano lessons that culminated in a recital at the Brooklyn Academy of Music.

To the very end, Lynette cultivated an extensive network of loving family and friends, young and old, who enjoyed her indomitable spirit, amazing hospitality, and her jovial wit - telling jokes with a wink of the eye.

She is survived by her children Joan, Dawn, Audrey, Paul and Tracey, son-in-law Jack Gaspar, and grandchildren Taylor Gaspar, Reginald Mousa Touré, and Sybil Maimouna Touré. She was predeceased by her son Reginald Thomas. Buxtonians in particular will remember her unwavering support to her birthplace, its school children, and St. Augustine Anglican Church, where she was baptized and confirmed.

A Memorial Service will be held at the Marble Collegiate Church in Manhattan on Sunday January 22, 2023 at 2:00 p.m. A Celebration of Life will be held on Saturday January 21, 2023, from 12:00 noon to 5:00 p.m., at Glen Terrace in Brooklyn. Internment of ashes will take place in Buxton, in February.
